Our Official Village Clock Winder Upper, Jolyon Marshall, is pleased to report that our 'Thomas West Memorial Clock' movement has now flown to Chalfont St. Giles for its 3 R's – Repair , Restoration & Re-build. It's expected to be away for at least twelve weeks which allows for disassembly, further inspections, repairs and the making of new replacement parts where required, prior to reassembly, extensive testing and preparations for its return to grace the entrance of the Village Hall once again.

Prior to its re-installation and recommissioning, plans are afoot to redecorate the lobby ceiling area of the Hall, so if you are able to volunteer a little of your time to help, this would be very welcome. Perspex viewing panels are also going to be installed so in future you will be able to view our Turret Clock movement with ease.

Finally, please also see our beautiful new Oak Clock box (photo bottom right) which has been made by Raymond Good Joiners Ltd. and kindly donated to the village.

Celebrating the life of Sheila Macleod



Sheila Dorothy Macleod, 8th August 1942 – 22nd February 2024

Last Thursday, villagers, friends and family packed St. John the Evangelist Church, Frieth, to remember and celebrate the life of Sheila Macleod. Moving and heartfelt tributes warmed our hearts, as did, indeed, the Spring sun which smiled benevolently down on the congregation as we gathered for the internment after the service.

Sheila was born in Inglenook, pictured here, continuing the generations of her family and its long association with the village. She later met and married her husband who, at the time, was an RAF Fireman stationed at Booker Airfield, an airfield she also worked at later for a glider repair and maintenance business. While, in reality, this was in a secretarial capacity, her family always joked that she kickstarted and test-drove anything that flew!

We heard of her immense love and care for her family, her wise counsel, and even of her darning abilities. Anecdotes laden with affection and

good humour fell effortlessly from the mouths of those remembering her, and we will probably all now be on the lookout for her missing tablecloth once carried off by a Red Kite as she sat just a few feet from her outside table!

I leave you with the closing words delivered so beautifully by her son, Don "Today we muster to celebrate the great life of Wife, Sister, Mum, Nan, Great Grandma, friend, wise counsel and a really lovely lady who was born in the bedroom of the house where, until the last few days of her life, she had lived. She loved Frieth. It was the centre of her universe, as she was ours."
